He came to this city in 1919 and took charge of the Waukesha Herald which had been purchased by Stevens Point interests. In the fall of 1920 the Herald and Freeman consolidated and Mr. Hoffman took active charge of the newspaper remaining here until April 1922. At that time Mr. Hoffman was suffering with the disease which caused his death and physicians advised that he enter some work which was not so strenuous. Accepting their advise he became editor of the Delavan Republican, a weekly newspaper, which did not demand so much of his time.

Became Secretary

In the winter of 1924 the Waukesha Association of Commerce was seeking a secretary and Mr. Hoffman accepted the position taking over his new duties here in March, 1924. He has held that position until the time of his death. Last spring he was elected city treasurer but was forced to resign when his condition became such that he was obliged to remain at home.

It was through Mr. Hoffman's efforts that the local Association of Commerce was given a new start in the city, the organization became a real aid to business men and the city as a whole.

The deceased was a member of the Knights of Columbus and Rotary (club. He is survived by his widow, seven children and his father and mother, of Stevens Point.

Announcement has come from Randle's funeral apartment that funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock in St. Joseph's Catholic church. Rt. Rev. Monsignor W. G. Miller will officiate. After services in this city the body will be taken to Stevens Point, for burial.
